June 05, 2025

Winter Wheat Headed by State

Texas - 100% Oklahoma - 100% Kansas - 96% Oregon - 88% Nebraska - 80% Washington - 66% Colorado - 64% Idaho - 36% South Dakota - 21% Montana - 19%

State Updates

<u>California</u>: Harvest in full swing, progressing quickly. Waiting to see what is grain vs. green chop.

<u>Illinois</u>: Southern state pretty wet, lots of planting delays. Disease concern, watching carefully. Hopeful to be on track for normal harvest (next 2 weeks).

Texas: Harvest progressing across state, but scattered precip. stalling. 17% harvested. South TX wrapping up, adequate conditions. Avg. TW 49.8 lb/bu, pro 13.2%, harvest starting in Rolling plains/Wichita falls, 20-50 bu/ac yields. Blacklands/Dallas 40-80 bu/ac. Panhandle a few weeks away but cool weather/moisture helping crops.

Oklahoma: Harvest slow progress due to rain. 4% harvested vs. 21% in 2024. Not expecting to get into field until middle/end of next week, rain forecast next few days. One good day of harvest on Monday, some 58.5 lb TW. Overall seeing 60 lb+ TW. Early protein tests running 11-11.5%. Decent yields, mid 30s-40s, management intensive fields making

mid-50s.

Kansas: Eye on all of the rain across the plains. Rains across state, pushed back harvest a week or two. Expecting a lot of variability in the crop. Not seeing rust, surprising since heavy rains.

<u>Colorado</u>: Good to excellent ratings rose this week. Northeast crop has a chance. Good chance now that we will see an average crop size (72 million bushel). Rain across state, wheat streak and Triticum mosaic virus.

Wyoming: Rain across SE WY, further North more abandonment. Most crop is headed, even late emerging crop. More precip. forecast. Cool temps, have not hit 80 F yet. 60s/70s forecast. Expecting early harvest, but temp/precip. could push to normal/mid-July harvest.

Nebraska: Lots of precip. across state past 10 days. Producer sentiment still low. Uneven crop, looking at earlier harvest but rain/moderate temps put more in line with average. Uneven stands. Field Days next week. Some diseases Eastern side of state (more rain), some wheat streak across state but low levels.

South Dakota: HRW and HRS crop ratings remained mostly unchanged from last week. The HRW crop is rated at 76% F-G and the HRS crop is rated at 52% G-E. The HRW crop is estimated to be 20% headed. The potential for FHB development remains very high and there have been reports of WSMV.


<u>Minnesota</u>: Fields in Crookston area up north looking good. Pretty dry, some areas with precip. Past week, moisture needed soon. Crop looks good so far. Wildfire smoke not expected to impact growing.

Idaho: Winter wheat is about 75% headed and spring wheat is fully emerged and growing nicely. The temperatures have swung between hot and cool and it has been dry but we have above adequate topsoil and subsoil moisture levels. NASS projects Idaho's harvest with a significant increase over last year but it is still early. Stands are good and so far looking good. No disease reported yet in this year's crop but may see some stripe rust depending on moisture.


Washington: Crop looking good, but heating up and rain needed. No rain forecast across state. NASS ratings holding on. Temps getting into upper 40s/low 50s at night, but getting into high 70s/mid 80s, 90s in some places for a few days. Unseasonably warm this time of year. Overall crop is still in good shape—but without a timely June rain, yield potential could begin to decline quickly.

Oregon: Slightly earlier than avg. in terms of progression, mostly headed aside from high elevations/late planted spring. Triple digit temps over the weekend, adding stress into conditions. Not seeing much on disease front, but watching for rust. Sizeable/troubling fire season predicted.

Nebraska Wheat Crop Report

District 3 Report

Wheat development in District 3 continues,

although field conditions vary across the region. Stands are generally thin, and field uniformity is limited, with uneven growth noted across much of the region. White caps have been observed in several areas, indicating crop stress caused by the lack of early-season moisture. However, the district has received much-needed precipitation over the past two weeks, totaling between 4 to 5 inches. Current yield estimates range from 40 to 50 bushels per acre in this area.



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Oregon Wheat Crop Report

June Status: Oregon Wheat

Beneficial rains in May supported the Oregon wheat crop development, as reflected in the USDA ratings, which are improved from a year ago during this same time period. Winter wheat headed as of June 1, 2025 was at 88%, which is ahead of the five year average of 74%.



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Oklahoma Wheat Crop Report

Oklahoma wheat harvest is at a standstill across the state today. Some minor harvesting continued in parts of southwest Oklahoma yesterday, but most areas were rained out. Heavy rainfall southwest and north of Altus moved east, bringing significant moisture to Grady County and locations further east of the I-35 corridor. Rain and high humidity also delayed harvest progress in central Oklahoma. Additional rainfall is predicted starting tomorrow and continuing through the weekend across western Oklahoma.
